Courage Class—shining in working together






Courage Class were wonderful pirates and great learners this week as we learnt about the high and low pitched sounds in Peter and the Wolf (by








tween some of the characters.


This half term we are learning

Pirate
Reading Day was extremely
entertaining, with many a
treasure and tome shared. We
completed a reading
comprehension on Treasure
Island, used mathematical

knowledge to find hidden pirate gold, used 4 and 6 figure grid references to plot a desert island with shipwrecks and buried treasure along with learning some of the history of the Golden Age of Piracy, pirates across the world (Grainne Mhaol, Xeng I Sao, Anne Bonney, Mary Read, Calico Jack Rackham, etc.) and looked a little bit at life aboard a pirate ship.

We ended the day by sharing our books with the rest of the school, and sang ourselves some hearty sea shanties about drunken sailors and a Beast of Pirate's Bay.

We've been exploring how to introduce not only ourselves, but also our families in Spanish and have begun the planning process for writing an adventure narrative and have started with a speed write unit of work on internal monologues and flash fiction in English.

In Maths we've moved on to fractions – looking at equivalent fractions as well as how to switch between improper fractions and mixed numbers and vice versa. We're drawing to the end of our Science unit on Evolution, with a look at Charles Darwin and slipping into the role of a naturalist ourselves for our assessment piece.

Most of the audience agreed with this but the story ended with the following line from the narrator:


"I think, I'm always right - except when


