#### **PEACE class shining in science**


#### **COURAGE Class shining in painting with scissors!**

What makes me laugh?





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
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# **ATTENDANCE MATTERS!**



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### Attendance



#### Attendance and absence figures explained!

Thank you to all those children and parents who have helped our overall attendance figure this academic year. Currently we are at 97.1% which shows a slight decline from our higher 97%+ figures last term but we need to maintain this level of attendance.

As a school, we aim for 96% as this was one of our Ofsted areas for improvement. However, if your child's individual attendance drops below 95% you will automatically receive a letter to alert you to their attendance to date and this may not be at the end of the term. Attendance doesn't reset at the end of each term as it is a cumulative figure.

If a child's attendance drops below 90%, they automatically fall into the Persistent Absence category which is another significant measure for the school. Once this is reached then parents will get a letter suggesting that you come into school for a meeting with the Headteacher to discuss the level of absence and how we can support you.

If a child is not present in school, then they are considered absent. Absence is recorded in two ways:

**Authorised absence** for events such as medical appointments. If the child's attendance is a concern, these appointments will need to be verified by a doctors or hospital letter and if these are not available then it could be considered as unauthorised absence.

**Unauthorised absence** is recorded for all holidays and all other non-school attendance that is not an exceptional circumstance. Parents must always request the leave to ensure the safeguarding of children is recorded, but holidays are not considered an exceptional circumstance. Generally, the DfE does not consider a need or desire for a holiday or other absence for the purpose of leisure and recreation to be an exceptional circumstance.

If a child misses 10 sessions through unauthorised absence (there are 2 per day), or 5 consecutive days over a 10-week period then there is an automatic referral to the local authority children and family services concerning the absence. These sessions also include any combination of unauthorised absence including any 6 sessions of arriving late to school within the 10-week period. The period of 10 school weeks can also span different terms or school years, for example, 2 sessions of unauthorised absence in the Summer Term and a further 8 in the Autumn Term.

As a school we must notify the local authority when a child misses 10 sessions over 10 weeks. This referral generates a penalty notice or fine, which is currently £80 per pupil per parent. Parents have the right of appeal within 28 days.

The new attendance regulations came into effect in August 2024 and are part of the Government's drive to increase school attendance across the country.

Notice of these new regulations was in the first school newsletter of this academic year 6<sup>th</sup> September 2024.

### **ADVICE FROM THE NSPCC**

### Understanding online games

Online games can be a great way for children and young people to keep busy and stay in touch with friends and family, but it's important that they play safely.

Things to consider if your child games online:

- age ratings of games they play
- messaging and contact functions on the games
- in-game purchases
- trolling, griefing and scams
- how to report problems
- where they can get further support.



Also, if you have more than one child in your home, be aware that games suitable for one child to play or watch, may not be suitable for another.

### Trolling, griefing and scams



Griefers are gamers who deliberately try to ruin the game for other players. This can also be called trolling. Players may also try to trick or scam young people into giving up 'skins' or other in-game items by offering them money or by hacking their account. Skins are a cosmetic feature that let players personalise their character and in-game items, they can be extremely rare and valuable so losing them can be upsetting for a child.

## Change settings

Some games let players turn off communications features, mute voice chat and report other players who behave inappropriately. Look at the settings available to see what's best for your child.

All major games consoles have <u>settings</u> that prevent children from finding inappropriate games. You can set limits on how long a young person can play and prevent them from speaking to unknown players. It's a good idea to explore these settings before your child plays the game.
