


What's happening in school?

feel their young fleeces.






Courage Class

Endurance Class shining in technology

This week we've been continuing our work on the circulatory system. The children of Endurance class have been working incredibly hard, memorising the different parts of the heart and the role of blood in the human circulatory system. Making use of the weather we decided it might be a fun idea to go outside and have a go at being blood for ourselves. The children worked



together to act out the flow of deoxygenated blood through the Vena Cava into the right atrium to the right ventricle, out to the lungs, back into the left atrium and into the right ventricle and out to the whole of the body through the Aorta. They've done exceptional work and we will continue to develop their knowledge in the coming weeks.

The children have also been very much enjoying their English units. In our VIPERS lessons they've been tackling Holes by Louis Sachar - a story about friendship, struggle, honesty, and "no-good-dirty-rotten-pig-stealing-great-great-grandfathers." We've also been working hard on poetry this half term, focusing of different styles (Haiku, Quatrain and Acrostic) but all centered around a single theme. I've been very impressed by how they've tackled some of the more challenging styles of poetry and look forward to seeing what they come up with.





The children also had an amazing VR experience this week as part of a proiect from Embrace Trust.

FOOD WASTE

New Government rules started on 1st April which means that **we must separate** our food waste from our general rubbish. The new orange wheelie bin is for food waste only. It is important that this only contains food as it is collected separately and weighed in on the day of collection. Any non food items in this wheelie bin will deem our waste as contaminated and we could be fined.

In the playground, we still have the blue bin which will be for all other NON-FOOD waste only. No food should be

thrown into this bin just wrappers but NOT apple cores or orange peel. This also means that all packed lunch waste will go home so that parents and carers are able to see exactly what their child has eaten and waste is disposed of at home.


Remember our school hours are:
