Times tables are a big feature in Courage Class this term and we are all engaged in Times Tables Rockstars and other activities to learn our tables up to 12 by heart.





We are helping each other to learn them and are becoming more fluent as we learn to recall



## What's happening in school? Endurance Class




### **Endurance class shining... in writing**

Endurance Class have been working incredibly hard over the course of this half term. In English we've concluded our work on writing explanations and instructions. We've worked together on the drafting and editing process to ensure that the work we have produced is the best it can possibly be. We have paid careful attention to the various skills we've practiced over the course of this unit as well as our handwriting, spelling and punctuation.



In History we've finished our unit on the Islamic Golden Age, from the Baghdad House of Wisdom and the development of medicine and education as well as commerce along the Silk Road, to the ultimate collapse of the Abbasid Caliphate at the hands of the Mongols and held a discussion around what the most important aspect was in the collapse of the Golden Age.

In Science we've wrapped up our work on lifecycles in humans and other animals, having had a look at the life cycles of human beings, plants and metamorphic animals. We've re-





In art we've been practicing turning a 2D negative space drawing into a 3D textured standee sculpture. We've looked at how to create a sense of tension using negative space in pencil drawings as well as using a variety of different materials to create a cohesive and textured model.

In RE we've explored what it means to be a Muslim in Modern Britain, having looked at the Five Pillars of Islam as well as the importance of the Mosque, Hajj and the necessity of Zakat. We've discussed what some of the challenged facing the British Muslim community and how learning Arabic and attending prayers at the Mosque can develop a sense of community.

#### **WEAR RED DAY**

Show Racism the Red Card (SRtRC) is the UK's leading anti-racism educational charity. It was established in January 1996, thanks in part to a donation by then Newcastle United goalkeeper Shaka Hislop.



In the 1990s, Newcastle United's 'Entertainers' were challenging for the Premier League title. It was with this back-

drop, that Shaka was at a petrol station near St. James' Park one day filling up his car with petrol when he was confronted by a group of young people shouting racist abuse at him. After they got closer and one of the group realised that they had been shouting at Shaka Hislop, the Newcastle United Goalkeeper. Their attitude suddenly went from abuse to admiration and instead they began asking for an autograph.




